CEO Message

We often hear from the women we serve that having access to the support of others who truly understand what they are going through is what makes our services so impactful. It allows for a special connection beyond cancer alone.

Hope. Strength. Knowledge. Community. Compassion. It is these connections that empower them through crisis—and we experienced that first-hand as an organization last year, too.

When COVID-19 was declared a global pandemic, we immediately took action, innovating our program delivery and fundraising, and implementing cost controls to ensure organizational health, minimal service disruption, and everyone's safety.

From the very beginning, you were there—dropping off supplies in response to our #HelpTheHouse Campaign, volunteering to drive women to treatment, coordinating grocery delivery, and providing much-needed financial support.

Syncrude presents Fashion with Compassion went virtual for the first time ever, with the support of a dynamic event committee, committed sponsors, and our "special models." The event was a massive success, generating 1,000 livestreams and raising over \$155,000.

We proudly expanded our programs and services across the province too, connecting women and families with the supports they needed from the comforts of home. Working closely with past guests of the House, we launched the Compassion Network Ambassador program, CompassionConnects, and the Inspiring Speakers Series, all while maintaining accommodation services at Sorrentino's Compassion House.

Through all of this, the women we serve have been an inspiration, demonstrating incredible strength and resiliency. Travelling far from home for cancer treatment is stressful enough; layer on the challenge of a global pandemic, and it is almost too much to bear.

Still, as difficult times attempted to drive us apart, 2020-21 highlighted the powerful, human connections that kept us together and operating through the pandemic—because cancer doesn't take a day off and together, we are stronger.


Supportive



THE GIFT OF TIME

Sayler Celebrates 15 Years at Sorrentino's Compassion House

Anyone who has visited, stayed at, or simply called Sorrentino's Compassion House has likely met Sayler Reins—and remembers her fondly. She is our Guest and House Services Manager, responsible for supervising House staff, supporting guests during their stay, and ensuring the House is well-maintained.

But, Sayler goes well beyond her job description. Beloved by many, Sayler is the heart of Sorrentino's Compassion House—our home—and in August, she celebrated 15 years of supporting women battling cancer who come through our doors.

Like the women we serve, Sayler's life has been deeply affected by cancer.

In mid-2003, she was diagnosed with cancer for the third time in just four years. It had metastasized to her bones and not long after, she was told there were no more treatments available. Time was not on her side.

But then, in early 2004, she was offered the chance to participate in a clinical trial. That opportunity turned into many years of gifts: seeing her children grow, becoming a grandmother—and her first encounter with Compassion House Foundation later that year singing at Syncrude presents Fashion with Compassion.

The following year, she was finally feeling well enough to go back to work and told her daughter: "Wouldn't it be great to work at a place like Compassion House Foundation? I think they really get it."

Well as fate would have it, her phone rang four hours later, and it was us offering her a job.

On August 9, 2005, Sayler checked in her first guest, and our 100th guest overall. Since then, she has directly supported 1,679 women.

Congratulations Sayler on 15 years of hard work, relationships, hope, and most of all... time.

Over the last 15 years, I've seen guests recover faster by sharing their feelings, fears, and stories; encounter hair loss sooner than expected but still find moments of laughter; brighten our home by sharing their talents and passions; forge lifelong friendships; check in on one another, even after they've returned home; find a sense of healing in their "new normal" post-treatment; and become champions for our cause. On May 19, 2020 Tiffany Blake heard the difficult, dreaded words, "You have cancer." She faced stage 3 cervical cancer with pelvic and abdominal lymph node involvement.

"I was just numb," said Tiffany, as she prepared to share the news with her family and friends.

Her recommended course of treatment was radiation and chemotherapy over six weeks, all at the Cross Cancer Institute in Edmonton. Tiffany lived in Fort McMurray.

With COVID-19 surging, and no family or friends to stay with, Tiffany began searching for a place to stay in Edmonton during her treatment—and found Sorrentino's Compassion House.

"I reached out and right away, I received a response and was told I had a room," said Tiffany. "I didn't have to think anymore about where I was staying. I told my family, and they felt relief too."

On July 2, Tiffany checked in for her first of 41 nights at the House.

"It was a moment I was dreading," she said. "Everything was now real."

Welcomed with a warm smile, staff showed Tiffany her room, toured her through the House, set up transportation to her daily appointments, and filled her prescription for delivery to the House. "Due to COVID-19, I wasn't able to have anyone with me; it was a very lonely and frightening feeling," said Tiffany. "The staff service made me feel cared for and not alone."

She became friends with the other guests, too—connected by shared experience.

"Everyone had one thing in common," said Tiffany.
"We shared laughs and tears during our daily updates, meals, movie nights, walks, and visits on the back deck and in the common areas. It was my safe haven."

Tiffany finished treatment and checked out on August 13, grateful for all the support and connections: "They made the worst time in my life bearable," she said.

After returning home to Fort McMurray, Tiffany quickly connected with the Foundation again as a volunteer Compassion Network Ambassador. In this role, she continues to support the Foundation and other women facing cancer in her community, giving back to those who gave her and her family so much.

"The House became my home and gave my family peace of mind," said Tiffany. "I'm so grateful for the support and for everyone who ensures the Foundation is available for women and their families during the cancer journey."

Compassion Network



Over the years, guests at Sorrentino's Compassion House have continuously expressed a need for support once they return to the rural communities they call home. With mental health a growing concern during the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew we had to respond.

So, we teamed up with the University of Alberta's Peter Lougheed Leadership College to launch a new program called CompassionConnects, made possible through a \$25,000 grant from Edmonton Community Foundation.

CompassionConnects is an online support hub that uses technology to connect cancer survivors with post-treatment resources—and each other—to:

COVID-19 RELIEF

#HelptheHouse

RAISED: \$25,000

In March, our inventory of paper products, cleaning supplies, and communal grocery items was beginning to run low due to COVID-19. So, we asked the community to #HelptheHouse, requesting donations through social media and media coverage in Edmonton, Grande Prairie, Fort McMurray, and Lloydminster—and the response was tremendous.

We replenished our inventory through **more than \$25,000** in **monetary and in-kind donations.** Donations from #HelptheHouse went to use immediately supporting guests with their most pressing needs and creating stability throughout the pandemic.

#GivingTuesdayNow

RAISED: \$10,000

In addition to the regularly-scheduled Giving Tuesday, a new global day of giving called #GivingTuesdayNow took place on May 5, 2020, as an emergency response to the unprecedented need caused by COVID-19.

We participated with a goal to raise \$5,000 for our Compassion Fund, which provides financial support for women staying at Sorrentino's Compassion House to help eliminate barriers to cancer treatment like accommodations, food, mileage, or other travel expenses.

Through community support, we raised \$4,200 on the day-of and an additional \$5,800 within the following week for a total of \$10,000 to exceed our goal.

SUPPORT

Remembering **Donna Whitford**

RAISED: \$40,000

Donna Whitford was a former guest of Sorrentino's Compassion House—a "Compassion Sister" through and through. She supported our organization in all that we did and was a tremendous source of light and joy to those around her in the House.

In her memory, the Whitford and Wong families organized a legacy fundraiser to support other women just like her, staying at Sorrentino's Compassion House from the Northwest Territories while receiving cancer treatment in Edmonton.

A portion of funds was also designated to renovate the sun deck into a sun-safe space called "Donna's Sun Sanctuary." As a true lover of the sun, fresh air, morning coffee, and friendly conversation, Donna spent countless hours on the deck visiting with others.

Donna, you are sincerely missed.

IN-KIND DONATIONS

MATTRESS MATTRESS LEDUC

Given how draining cancer treatment can be, it is important that guests staying at Sorrentino's Compassion House have a comfortable place to lay their heads and rest.

Mattress Mattress Leduc understood this need and in November, helped to replace all the mattresses throughout the House. Specifically, Mattress Mattress Leduc **donated** seven mattresses and box springs and helped coordinate the sale of 13 mattresses and box springs from Serta at cost.

SUNTERRA MARKET

To help keep our guests healthy and safe, Sunterra Market began donating fresh fruit to Sorrentino's Compassion House weekly, plus coordinating online grocery orders and prepared meal service with direct delivery to the House.

Starting in February, they also launched an initiative for customers to purchase food bags packed with nutritious, non-perishable items that were then donated to our communal Family Pantry. We received **more than 200 food bags** within the first month alone.

You Healed Our Wheels

Since 2013, we have operated a Sorrentino's Compassion House van to transport guests to-and-from appointments outside of the Cross Cancer Institute (CCI) shuttle service and throughout the city during their stay. Amidst the physical, mental, and financial devastation of a cancer diagnosis, it is a simple service that makes a big difference.

When the CCI had to suspend its shuttle service due to COVID-19, staff and volunteers stepped up to transport guests using our van alone. Our guests came to rely on the van. For many, it was their only means of transportation during their stay.

On January 28, 2020, another vehicle hit our van while a volunteer was driving two guests from their appointments. The volunteer and guests were not hurt in the collision, but our van suffered a significant amount of damage and had to be written off.

We turned to the community for help, with a goal to raise \$27,000 to "Heal our Wheels." Through community donations and a \$25,000 major gift, we surpassed our goal and raised \$35,700 to replace our van.

Within the week, we purchased a 2021 Chrysler Pacifica Touring L from Southtown Chrysler and hit the road, once again safely and conveniently transporting our guests to-and-from cancer treatment. Thank you for the support!


