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MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

If there's anything we've learned at Compassion House Foundation during another challenging year of the COVID-19 pandemic, it's the importance of leaning on each other through crises, and the power of community.

When our guests come to Sorrentino's Compassion House, they're leaving the familiarity of home and seeking a haven during cancer treatment. But our hope is to offer more than a safe, comfortable, and affordable place to stay; we want to provide a community where they can feel connected, supported, and uplifted during the cancer journey.

Throughout the past year, the community outside of the House has continued to rally around us, offering their support in so many incredible ways that continue to make a difference for the women we serve. Whether it be through donations, in-kind gifts, or volunteering, their compassion and generosity has shone through some of the darkest times.

In May, we launched the first ever Walk Her Way 5K fundraiser, and were blown away by its success. Folks across the province joined us virtually to complete a 5 km walk or run, stepping into 'her' shoes in a symbolic show of solidarity for women battling cancer. Thanks to our participants and sponsors, we surpassed our goal of \$50,000 and raised \$63,000 for our cause.

Syncrude presents Fashion with Compassion took place virtually for the second year in a row, but this night was extra special — our 25th anniversary event. As we celebrated this huge milestone, we raised just under \$155,000 and enjoyed a spectacular evening, once again made possible by our dedicated event committee and sponsors.

No matter what adversities we face, it's humbling to know that we have the unyielding support of our community to fall back on in times of need. To achieve our mission of easing the distress of the cancer journey for women, it takes hands, it takes hearts.

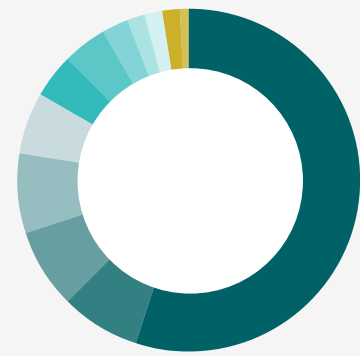
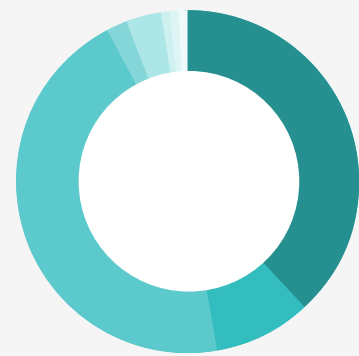

A HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Living in Westlock, Lola was a farm wife for most of her life and enjoyed being out in the country. After her husband passed away, she moved into town and kept a busy social life as part of a seniors' club, curling, and as a member of the ladies' auxiliary at the local Legion.

Then Lola received the daunting news: she was diagnosed with a glomus tumor located behind her right ear. She was told that the tumor was inoperable, as surgery would be too high-risk. Radiation was the only route to take in hopes to stop the tumor from growing.

With no family nearby to drive her back and forth to Edmonton for her treatments, Lola felt uncertain about how she would manage travelling an hour and a half each way to all of her appointments. Then, Lola learned about Sorrentino's Compassion House from her neighbours.

On January 16th, Lola checked into the House. She would stay for five weeks total, and undergo 25 radiation treatments at the Cross Cancer Institute.

Lola said that she was anxious to be away from home for so long as she isn't one for travelling, but felt immediately at ease after the first few days she spent at the House. She felt like she was greeted royally and was blown away by the compassion from the staff and other guests. After the tour of the House, she received her own quilt and a beautiful gift package to make her feel more welcome.

"After the first week at Compassion House, it honestly felt like home. You could relax, do what you wanted to do and if you needed anything, help was there."

Lola quickly made friends with the other women in the House, growing close to each other through their shared experience. She really enjoyed her morning and afternoon coffee visits. "We became friends quite fast," she said. "We helped each other as much as we could. I made three really good friends, and while it was sad to see them go home, you were happy for them."

One of her favourite things to do in the House was spend time in the craft room with the other ladies, sharing stories. "They've got everything in that craft room. We were pretty good at finding things to pass the day and fill our time."

The strong connections she made were what helped her the most through this difficult time. "You have so many thoughts and so many worries. Then you come into Compassion House, and meet all of these other women who are in the same boat you are. If you were down in the dumps, there was always somebody you could talk to."

The convenience of staying at the House, as well as the affordability, also helped ease so many of the worries she had faced at the start of her journey. "Having the opportunity to stay at this place helped me feel so comfortable. I didn't have to worry about driving back and forth, or the cost of gas. For the price that you pay to stay at the House, it was next to nothing. It was worth every penny."

Since returning home, Lola still has the special quilt she was given on her bed. She says that it serves as a reminder that there are people who are always thinking of you, and want to help others when they need it most.

"It's so touching to know that there are so many caring and loving people in this world, really and truly. You hear about the bad all of the time, but we don't hear enough of the good."

Based on her time spent at the House, Lola says that the name is truly fitting. "Compassion is such a beautiful word, and you can feel that love and energy that is put into the House."

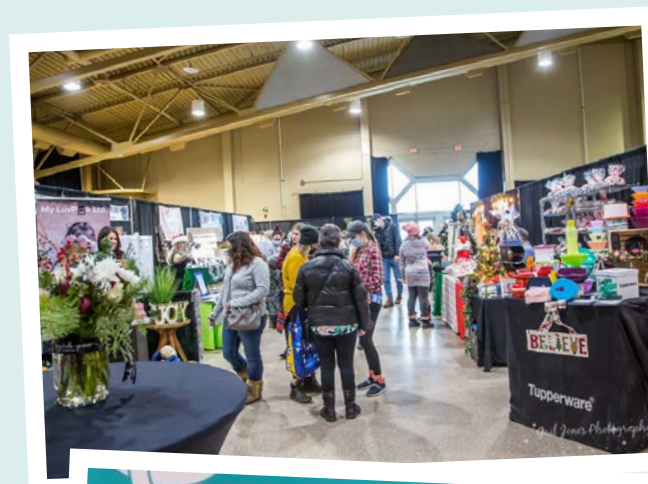

SEASON OF GIVING:

TINSELTOWN WINTER MARKET SUPPORTS THE HOUSE

Grande Prairie Tinseltown Winter Market in support of Compassion House Foundation took place in November, just in time for the holiday season.

The event organizer, Erin Weeks, has a personal connection to Sorrentino's Compassion House, which is why she chose to support our organization for her second annual market. "In January of 2018, my mom was diagnosed with breast cancer and stayed at Sorrentino's Compassion House in July during her radiation treatments," said Erin. "The following year, my auntie was diagnosed as well as several of my closest friends' moms, all who stayed at the House as well."

"When I went down to visit my mom during her treatments, I was in awe at the care the women received, along with the beauty of the Home. It truly is a home away from home, and I knew I needed to get involved on a much larger scale."

Many of the women who volunteered at the market over the weekend were also former guests of Sorrentino's Compassion House. **With 80 vendors and over 3000 attendees, the market was an incredible success, raising over \$24,000 for our organization.**

THE GIFT OF COMPASSION

When Joanne was diagnosed with basal cell adenocarcinoma in the parotid gland, her life was suddenly turned upside down. After undergoing multiple surgeries, her recommended course of treatment was radiation over six weeks at the Cross Cancer Institute in Edmonton. Being from Grande Prairie, Joanne began searching for a place to stay during treatment. That's when she heard of Sorrentino's Compassion House.

While she didn't know what to expect when she arrived at the House, Joanne was blown away by everything it had to offer. The communal kitchen area, laundry room, and overall coziness and cleanliness of the House made it feel like a second home.

Joanne found the shuttle van service was especially helpful, taking her to every appointment.

“The van was fabulous, and they had great people driving it too.”

Staff would also take her grocery shopping, ensuring that all of her needs were met during her stay.

Joanne quickly bonded with some of the other guests at the House. “One of the ladies had started a puzzle up in the craft room, and I went up one day to help and it was gone. The next day, I asked her if she was still doing the puzzle and she said, ‘It’s too lonely up there.’” When a staff member overheard this, they suggested the ladies bring the puzzle downstairs so that they could complete it together.

“We started doing puzzles in the common areas, and some of the evening staff helped us. It was fantastic. You got to see everyone who walked by, and they would stop and chat.”

The close connections that were formed helped make some of the heaviest days feel lighter. “If you’ve had a rough day, people are there to listen to you. The staff are there to listen. It’s like a family away from home.”

When her treatments were coming to an end and it was almost time to head home to Grande Prairie, Joanne received a special surprise that would make all the difference. Sayler, our House and Guest Service Manager, asked to meet with Joanne privately to share some good news.

“A couple days before I left Sorrentino's Compassion House, Sayler pulled me into the office and told me that my stay was paid for.” This was made possible through the Compassion Fund, designed to eliminate some of the financial barriers for the women we serve, including the cost of their stay at the House.

Joanne was stunned and couldn't believe the immense relief this gift provided. “I said to her: ‘You have no idea what this does for me.’ Six weeks is a long time to stay. To have my bill covered was unbelievable.”

Since returning home, Joanne has still kept in touch with the women she bonded with during her stay, grateful for the healing support they gave each other.

“If you don't have cancer, you don't know what it's like. You don't know what someone else is really going through other than what they tell you,” Joanne said. “But having someone there that can listen, and hearing everybody's different stories, it's amazing. And you make lifelong friends.”

INSPIRING SPEAKERS SERIES

PRESENTED BY CPA ALBERTA

The fight against cancer involves so much more than medical treatment alone. Our Inspiring Speakers Series is about starting important conversations on the many ways cancer impacts patients, families, and caregivers.

Hosted by CEO Michelle Okere, each session featured stories from cancer survivors connected to Compassion House Foundation, alongside insight from relevant health professionals, to educate the public on what we can all do to better support women through their cancer journey.

April 1, 2021

SCREENING MAMMOGRAPHY AND BREAST ULTRASOUND

In this session, Dr. Ify McKerlie covered the importance of screening mammography, breast density, and the use of ultrasound in breast imaging. We also heard the personal stories of former Sorrentino’s Compassion House guests, Marina Rosta and Karen Stroebel, who shared how breast imaging led to life-saving detection in their own diagnoses.

April 22, 2021

THE CHALLENGES OF PARENTING WITH CANCER

In this session, we partnered with Knight’s Cabin to discuss the challenges of parenting with cancer. We received useful tools provided by Sarah O’Brien from Shift Psychological, and were joined by two mothers affected by cancer, Marina Rosta and Julie Rohr, who shared their personal experiences.

June 24, 2021

THE BENEFITS OF EXERCISE THROUGHOUT THE CANCER JOURNEY

In this session, Chris Sellar with the Alberta Cancer Exercise (ACE) Study discussed how research evidence supports the benefit of exercise to improve symptoms related to cancer, at every stage of treatment and recovery. Former Sorrentino’s Compassion House Guest, Tiffany Blake also shared her story and the impact exercise had on her cancer journey.

November 17, 2021

EATING WELL DURING AND AFTER CANCER TREATMENT

In this session, Katherine Ford, Registered Dietitian with PradoLab, discussed the importance of nutrition to cancer survivorship. Sundas Shamshad, Former Guest of Sorrentino’s Compassion House and Compassion House Foundation Board Member, also shared her story and the impact nutrition had on her cancer journey.

A HEALING SISTERHOOD

Sharon first heard of Sorrentino's Compassion House and how it supported women battling cancer through Carmelo Rago at the original Sorrentino's restaurant, back when she lived in Edmonton.

Years later, now living in Barrhead, Sharon faced her own terrible diagnosis: she had breast cancer.

Since her husband was no longer able to drive, she raised the concern to her doctor about travelling back and forth to Edmonton for treatments. The doctor suggested looking into Sorrentino's Compassion House.

While Sharon had heard of the House before, she didn't know many details or if she would qualify to stay there. "From the very first time I reached out, everyone was so helpful and compassionate," she said.

"When they say Compassion House, they really mean it. I don't know what I would do without them."

Sharon arrived December 19th, 2021 and was scheduled to have a lumpectomy the very next day. "It was right around Christmas, so talk about a stressful time to be going through breast cancer."

Despite a short three-day stay, Sharon said she was able to feel some of the holiday spirit. "It's the holidays, you're going through all of this and you're scared to death, but the House was all decorated and was right into the Christmas mood."

She would later return for two more stays, once for a mastectomy and another for further testing at the Cross Cancer Institute.

Since she didn't have any family close by to take her to appointments, the House van was an added bonus and staff always ensured she was looked after. "It was really just like home. Even better!"

Sharon said one of the things that stood out to her most during her stay at the House was how everyone had a personal connection to cancer and could understand the journey she was on. "All of the guests and staff I met were all touched by cancer. They all had an understanding of what women were going through, and that's not something you can really explain unless you've gone through it."

"It's the fear, the anxiety, the helplessness. 'What do I do next? Where do I stay? What do I do?' There's a million questions and at Sorrentino's Compassion House, they understood. They took care of everything, and all of those questions were eliminated."

Sharon felt supported by staff and other guests during a time she needed it most. "The women there were there to comfort each other and would do what they could for each other. It was like a big sisterhood. If you didn't feel like talking, you got your space and time alone. But if you wanted to talk, someone was always there to help you; staff, guests, everybody."

"At a time when you're at your most vulnerable and scared, Compassion House gives people a chance to take care of themselves and it's not going to financially strap them. Every dollar is worth what you give because of the compassion that is there and the wellbeing of people."

"Cancer is eventually going to touch somebody you know," said Sharon. "My heart breaks for women who have to travel for their cancer treatment and are not aware of Sorrentino's Compassion House and the comfort it provides. Because that is the place to stay."

CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF FASHION WITH COMPASSION

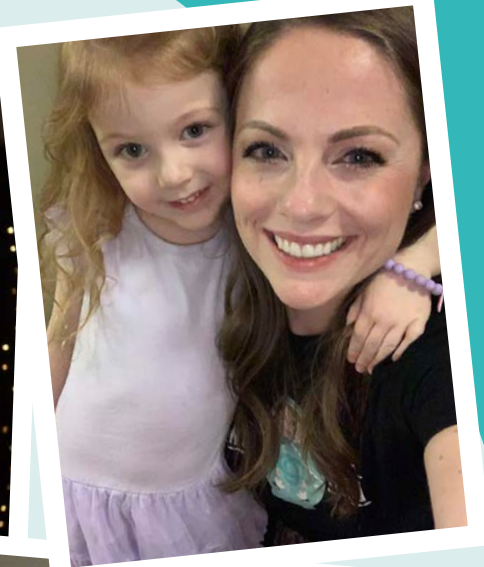

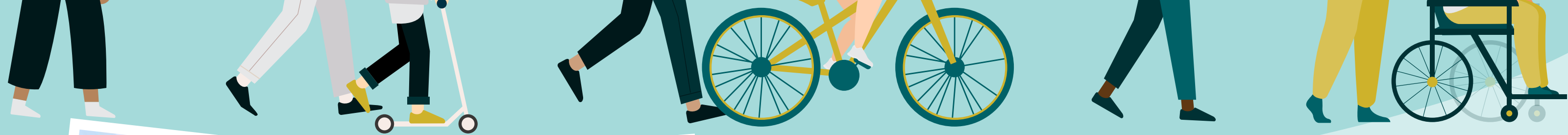

STEPPING INTO 'HER' SHOES:

OUR FIRST WALK HER WAY 5K

On International Women's Day, we launched our first ever Walk Her Way 5K virtual walk/run fundraiser, encouraging participants to step into 'her' shoes — the hundreds of women who access our services each year — in a symbolic show of solidarity. The event raised critical funding for Compassion House Foundation, helping to ease the distress of the cancer journey for women through Sorrentino's Compassion House, post-treatment programs, financial support, and reliable operations.

The event period took place between May 13-16, 2021 and we were joined by over 170 people from across Alberta and beyond. Participants fundraised in advance and completed a 5 km walk or run through sunny and overcast conditions, along wooded trails, mountains, country roads and beaches, solo and safely as groups. Our sponsored trails were located in Edmonton, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, and Jasper with the support of our Ambassadors bringing their communities together for our event.

Thanks to the successful 3-day weekend, we surpassed our original goal of \$50,000 and reached a total of \$63,100. The support from Walk Her Way 5K has helped women battling cancer find comfort, connection, and community during a time when they need it most.
